

Pupil Premium Report 2016-17

The Government believes that Pupil Premium, which is additional to main school funding, is the best way to address current underlying inequalities between children eligible for free school meals (FSM) and those that are not.

Pupils qualifying for Pupil Premium are defined as:

- Those registered for free school meals (or have been at any time in the last 6 years, known as Ever 6)
- Those who are classed as Looked after Children (LAC)
- Those who *were* LAC but are not now (Post Looked After Children)
- Those who are from Service Families

Schools are accountable for how they have used the additional funding and must publish information relating to Pupil Premium on-line to ensure all stakeholders are fully aware of the impact of the premium. Government performance tables also capture the achievement of those covered by the Pupil Premium.

Impact	EYFS – Three children were pupil premium in this age group. Of these one child achieved GLD 2 (Age related expectations). This is lower than previous years. Over two years there have been a total of 9 pupil premium children, of which 7 have achieved GLD 2 which is 78% - broadly in line with National data for all children.
	Year 1 – 6 pupil premium children. 100% passed the phonics test (whole school 89%) which is significantly above national. Over two years, 9 pupil premium children, all of whom have passed the phonics test. This is because of small group phonics teaching, using Read Write Ink.
	Key Stage 1 Outcomes – 100% 3 pupil premium children who all reached age related expectations in Reading, Writing, Maths and Science. Whole cohort (12 children) 75% achieved age related expectations in Reading, Writing, Maths and Science which is broadly in-line with national. Over two years, 9 pupil premium children, 7 out of 9 (78%) met age related expectations, above national data for all children..
	Key Stage 2 children – 2 pupil premium children. Both children were disapplied from the Y6 SATs. One child joined the school in year 5 summer term and was significantly below age-related expectations. The other child had an EHC plan for cognitive difficulties and ADHD. Teacher assessment showed that both children were working below age-related expectations but made progress with their learning. Small intervention groups, using Further Literacy Strategy and Rapid Maths contributed towards this.
	Pupil premium children who want to play a musical instrument are able to engage and enjoy this.
All Pupil Premium children are able to access extra-curricular activities.
