

Pupil Premium Report 2017 - 18

The Government believes that Pupil Premium, which is additional to main school funding, is the best way to address current underlying inequalities between children eligible for free school meals (FSM) and those that are not.

Pupils qualifying for Pupil Premium are defined as:

- Those registered for free school meals (or have been at any time in the last 6 years, known as Ever 6)
- Those who are classed as Looked after Children (LAC)
- Those who *were* LAC but are not now (Post Looked After Children)
- Those who are from Service Families

Schools are accountable for how they have used the additional funding and must publish information relating to Pupil Premium on-line to ensure all stakeholders are fully aware of the impact of the premium. Government performance tables also capture the achievement of those covered by the Pupil Premium.

IMPACT

EYFS – Two children were Pupil Premium for this age group. One child achieved GLD 2 (Age related expectations)
Year 1 – 4 Pupil Premium children. 100% passed the phonics test (whole school 87%) above national. Over 3 years 13 pupil premium children have all passed the phonics test because of investment in small group phonics teaching, using Read Write Inc.
Key Stage 1 Outcomes – 6 Pupil Premium children. Reading 100% achieved standard and 33% achieved Greater Depth. Writing 4 children achieved standard (4/6) and 33% achieved Greater Depth. Maths 100% achieved standard and 33% achieved Greater Depth. Reading and Maths above non-pupil premium children nationally and broadly in-line (within 1-child for writing).
Key Stage Two – Year 6: 4 Pupil Premium children (all girls). 75% achieved the standard in writing. 75% achieved the standard in reading and 25% achieved the standard in Maths.
Pupil Premium children who want to play a musical instrument are able to engage and enjoy this.
All Pupil Premium children are able to access extra-curricular activities
